5) BCCPAC - Chris Schultz-Lorentzen President

Background to the BCCPAC - DPACs support PACs and BCCPAC is the accepted voice for PACs. Deal directly with the Ministry on certain issues and is a support/guidance for BC PACs. Everyone wants the best for education no matter which partner group. Structured by a Board under the Societies Act. CEO/Executive Director helps to guide the board and an office staff of 1.5 and board members are volunteers like us. BCCPAC does not have any authority over PACs/DPACs is just a support for us. Have workshops for member PACs and hold town halls as needed.

 - Strategic plan and annual budget are now approved. Had over 700 participants in the process. Thank you to everyone who contributed.
 - Grad season 378 graduates and 75 indigenous students celebrating this year.

 - Online learning programs. Desk & Homelinks

- MOECC revised the distributed learning programs and renamed it to online learning, effective July 1.
- o Part of that revision was the creation of Provincial Online Learning Schools.
- More consistency in online learning schools. SD8 was accepted.
- Elevate/Desk is a traditional online learning program with everything online. Used to be done through the mail system but now is online. It is teacher delivered and directed.
- Homelinks are more community based programs so there is an opportunity for blending learning. A teacher works with families and there is also an in-person component.

- o It is open enrollment high school students can apply now and work through the summer.
- No enrollment projections but are ready to act on things quickly.
- Students from our district can also cross-enroll in other POLS not in SD8.

8) Correspondence

- Dyslexia resolutions for BCCPAC letter received. An email received after the BCCPAC conference from a teacher. The teacher wrote that she almost cried when she read the news (that the resolution had passed) because she has been advocating for this for years and passes on her thanks.
- Superintendent Smillie letter regarding corrections from April meeting. Director Eaton is happy
 to take any questions back if needed. He has noted the questions and has asked for the
 documents to be shared after the meeting to ensure accuracy.

Question - What is the DPAC process for distributing the information? The superintendent had
requested information to be shared with the reps. Followed the protocol of passing along the
email to the people that it was relevant to (did not use the entire route list) as requested by the
superintendent.

9) Discussion Items

- a) BCCPAC Conference & AGM Report, by Natalia & Colleen
 - Will not share all of it tonight but will email it.
 - Natalia asked Chris Schultz-Lorentzen from BCCPAC to explain the first speaker further. Parents
 could get a sense of what it was like at the provincial level. Membership is voluntary in the BC
 Principals and Vice Principal group. The presentation was an overview of how they work
 together and how BCCPAC fits into the advocacy piece. One example was the School Plan boards look at this for district and strategic plans. Every partner group has different roles and
 responsibilities but want the same thing for education.
 - Attended all the breakout sessions, with the help of Kendra Mann from SD20. Natalia attended
 an advocacy session document everything emphasized that it is important to send a thank you
 note and reflect back on your points of the meeting. If there is no reply back it is a way of
 accepting what you heard.
 - Colleen attended the session on Integrated Child & Youth Teams, ICY, (children's mental health).
 Goal is to implement ICY teams in every school district to make it completely accessible and provide wrap-around services.
 - Also shared details on the Consent Cafe developed at Thompson River University. It is NOT sex-ed. About training our youth so they have proper ideas on what consent is.
 - Communicating Student Learning session emphasized that ministry is trying to encourage
 evaluation according to the individual child. Need to compare a child in
 September/December/June rather than comparing different children. Need to shift our mindset
 to make sure every child is growing and learning rather than comparing children.
 - BC Ombudsperson presentation sometimes advocacy cases cannot be resolved at school or district level or even the provincial level. They are a neutral third party and the duty is to evaluate fairness.
 - BCCPAC AGM SD8 had six schools not registered with BCCPAC this year. There was a motion
 this year that passed by one vote and we (SD8 DPAC) were voting against it. The report shows
 the resolutions as they have been changed during the meeting so does not match the resolution
 booklet. Our resolutions (Literacy Centres and Science Based Reading) were passed.

b) Committee Reports - Education Partner Advisory Committee from May 9, by Taryn

• Superintendent spoke - Draft Strategic Plan will be proposed to the board for approval that evening. It is a vision document, mission and commitments of the board and what we are aiming for wrt student improvement. Reflects all the phases of the engagement process from January to May. Will communicate to partners after board approval.

- 5 Strategic Priorities with several goals under each 1) Lifelong Learners, 2) Connected Learners,
 3) Caring & Inclusive Learning Culture, 4) Cultural & Identity Development and 5) Career
 Development
- Director Ben Eaton shared the Framework for Enhancing Student Learning alignment and coherence, annual cycle includes data analysis of student learning outcomes, design of school/district plans, shared video of the student symposium from February (is one piece of the street level data)
- District Principal Maloff connects school planning with school based professional development days, details on numeracy spring learning series – anchoring workshop, demonstrations classrooms at 3 families of schools (show teachers how to implement a strategy with an opportunity to discuss and debrief), then a May workshop and school based PD day.
- District Numeracy Teacher David Salisbury Rowswell shared practices (commonly agreed upon) of things to focus on with math education example put kids in a position where they have to struggle a bit (productively) because that reinforces the learning, did a demonstration with the room, ideally groups of 3, each group only gets one marker, ultimate goal is to give teachers a common focus to help each other become better at what they are doing
- School learning plans and learning tours coming up, in person by family of schools
- Next meeting June 13,
- c) Committee Reports Operations & Finance, attended by both Taryn (sub for Colleen) and Tyler
 - Superintendent presented the recommended budget to the committee was approved by the board later that evening.
 - The budget should reflect SD8 values from the new Strategic Plan. Highlights of budget:
 - Slight decrease in expected student attendance, only 6 FTE.
 - Increased funding provincially for unique needs (designations), salary differential (very slight increase) and geographic adjustment.
 - Now have an employee engagement fund, increasing funding for student transportation (field trips), reestablish funding for student-led district wide events, increased support staff, greater focus on food equity, hardship funding for all schools, increased school counselor allocations for schools, reallocated funds for knowledge keepers and Elders, Expansion of Trades programming, school transportation budgets increased to support career exploration and community engagement.
 - Additional observations from the official Finance & Ops rep based on the recent budget season from cradle to grave. Observations from this year compared to a prior year and based on his accounting experience.
 - F&O meeting frequency is less and there is less to view
 - Could correlate the strategic plan to the budget
 - Chair Trenamen requests that these detailed questions be asked of the superintendent.
 - Tyler had requested a motion to be reviewed by the DPAC exec to draft a letter to the board. Chair recommends that we defer this item so there is more time to review it.

10) School Reports

- LVR new VP as well, mental health presentation for students and community, school sports, travel is expensive for provincials, ideas for Atlas program to be able to have training in avalanche zones
- ARES Learning fair tour of school, owl dissection, drum group, powwow at rec center, track meet

 for the Grade 6's at the end of June, school-wide fun day June 28
